# In the beginning

Every Christian worship service follows the same pattern. The service includes some combination of the same parts often called: Gathering, Word, Meal, and Sending. These four sections include within them all that we do during a worship service.

The Gathering contains opening prayer, music, and confession.

The  $\mathcal{W}\mathit{ord}$  contains scripture, teaching or sermon, music, and prayers.

The Meal consists of gathering around the Lord's table and sharing communion together.

The Sending contains a time of turning our attention out to the world, the announcements of what is to come, and a celebration of God's grace in a benediction and closing song that sends us forth with God's grace to be God's grace to the world around us.

This pattern is largely consistent across the church whether you are worshiping at a Lutheran congregation, or at a Methodist, Catholic, Baptist or another Christian denomination. However, this pattern isn't just found in our worship services, it can also be found throughout all of the ministries and activities of this congregation at St James.

As you read through this document, you will see this pattern of Gathering - Word - Meal - Sending carried through the many different parts of our life together and the many different ways in which we experience God's grace in our community. Truthfully there are so many ways that God has blessed us over the past year that not all of them can fit inside this document, but hopefully those that are captured here help to showcase just some of the ways that God continues to gather us, teach us, nourish us, and send us out into the world to be Christ's hands and feet.



"For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them" (Matthew 18:20)

Every worship service begins with a portion of the service called gathering. It's in this section that we are drawn into the worship service itself, setting aside this moment in time so that we might encounter God more fully.

This section of the service normally begins with music and prayer to set the tone for the rest of the service.

When we gather we bring our whole selves, our joys and our concerns, our roles and our responsibilities, our passions and our fears, and we come together as a community so that we might be sustained by the grace and love of God which is revealed most often in our relationships with others.

Throughout the year we gathered not just for worship, but also in a variety of other ways in which we also experienced God's presence in our community.







# Gather



At the beginning of the year we gathered on two Saturdays in January for a new members class, getting to know the people that God had most recently brought to our community who desired to join us in the mission that God has called us to. This was a wonderful experience filled with conversation, laughter, learning, and food. We officially received those new members at the worship service prior to our 2023 Annual Meeting, and we are grateful for the way that their presence has blessed our congregation.





Also in January, members of our community gathered for our Martin Luther King Jr. Day of Service in which we learned about how God was at work through the life and ministry of The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Children were asked to add leaves to our "Peace Tree" identifying ways in which they can show kindness. Participants also made PB&J sandwiches and cookies for guests at God's Kitchen Soup Kitchen in Pottstown and Valentines for the residents of a nearby assisted living facility.



While much of their time at the His Kids
Preschool is spent on St James campus,
enrolled families are invited to join the kids
for holiday celebrations including
Thanksgiving, Christmas and an Easter Egg
Hunt. Families enjoyed a hayride at
Olszanowski Farm and a "signs of Spring"
tour at Green Lane Park. They even
welcomed the traveling "Family Stages"
theater group to perform "Puss in Boots".



In March, our middle- and high school students gathered along with youth from 6 other congregations in our area for Box City where they learned more about the challenges of homelessness in our area and how God is calling us to serve those in need. Students assembled an indoor encampment made of large cartons, participated in small group lessons that helped them identify and understand the challenges one faces when they are underserved.



Guest speakers included a safety resource officer from Spring-Ford Area School District and Tom Niarhos, Director of Beacon of Hope, an organization in Pottstown that supports displaced and unhoused neighbors. We raised close to \$2,000 for Pottstown Beacon of Hope and created a work of art for them to hang in their future, still-to-be-built overnight warming center.





This past Fall we hosted our annual Apple Festival community event. While the weather was cold and rainy, we didn't let that dampen our spirits. We came together for fun, fellowship, food, and raised \$5,065 for the ministries here at St. James so that we might continue doing the work that God is calling us to do. Of the money raised, we gave 10% to Lutheran Disaster Relief, to help victims of disasters around the world.

Each year we host Trunk or Treat to provide church and community children a safe and fun Halloween. Once again, the weather was cold and rainy and so we took shelter indoors for our hot dog dinner. The atmosphere inside was warm, lively and fun and the cars and costumes were spectacular!

Finally to finish off our year, our preschool ministry held a wonderful Christmas gathering for all of the students and their families. The students did an incredible job singing and dancing for their families, adding even more joy to the holiday season.

Gathering as a community is sacred practice whether it is for worship, or fun, or fellowship, being together as a community is a blessing and scripture reminds us that wherever two or three are gathered, God is there among us.









"For the Lord gives wisdom; from his mouth come knowledge and understanding." (Proverbs 2:6)

After we gather as a community for worship we settle into a period of growth, learning, and contemplation where our faith is formed through "the word": scripture, preaching, proclamation of the creed, music, and prayer.



This portion of the service is designed to help us grow in faith and understanding, connecting with God in the words that are heard and spoken. God continues to form our faith in so many other ways as well and many of the ministries here at St. James are focused on helping people of all ages to grow in faith.

For the youngest members of our community,

faith formation takes place through our His Kids Preschool and Kids Connect Christian education ministries.



Throughout the week, our preschool ministry helps children to learn and grow in an encouraging and joyful environment. Children experience Worship every other week. Each worship lesson is interactive using puppets, acting out the story with our bodies, or even looking at Pastor Chris' cool *Brick Bible*. We sing a new song with each Bible story and then end with our favorite song, "Jesus Loves Me". Our

children look forward to Worship weeks led by Pr. Chris, Miss Bobbie and Mrs. Hilsmier.

# Word





On Sunday mornings, our children experience growth and formation as they participate in our Kid's Connect Christian education ministry where they learn about the story God has been telling since the beginning of creation, and how they are a part of that amazing story. While this weekend ministry is geared towards children, the lessons are shared in our large-group worship space so that all who come to worship may learn the value and meaning of virtues in both biblical and real-life context.



The summer presents an opportunity each year for our community to gather for a special time of learning and fun at our Vacation Bible School. This year we partnered with 3 area congregations in sharing the props and sets to set the scene for this wonderful event, and also in the execution of the event as members from St. Luke's Lutheran Church in Zieglerville joined us for the week. Together we were able to create a wonderful event that blessed the nearly 75 participants. Kids and adults alike were encouraged to "shine Jesus' light" in every situation, to all people.



As our youth grow older, we invite them to participate in a faith milestone known as Confirmation: where our youth are invited to affirm the promises made at their baptism. Through this ministry, our confirmands encounter the grace and love of God through the stories of scripture, as well as through their peers and their own life experiences.

In the Fall of 2023, we began a combined-confirmation ministry with 5 local Lutheran congregations, providing students a large group experience with a rotating location hosted by each participating congregation. God is blessing students and leaders while strengthening relationships between these congregations.



High school students were encouraged to participate in Worship services, played an integral part in our Vacation Bible School, help with fundraisers, and support our Christian education program by helping out in Nursery and Kids Connect. They met regularly to devote time to learning more about their role in God's kingdom.





Finally, one of the greatest ways to learn and grow is to participate in the formation of others and that's exactly what 6 of our youth did this past Christmas Eve as they came together to lead worship during our Youth-Led Christmas Eve service which included acting out several skits of the Christmas story interspersed between song and scripture.







For the adults in our community, one of the primary ways that we experience faith formation is through hearing the story of scripture and applying those stories to our lives in our Adult Bible studies. This year our three Bible studies have covered the books of Romans, 1 Timothy, Jonah and Hebrews.

Growing in faith is a life-long experience and through these ministries for children, youth, and adults, God continues to shape us, form us, and sustain us as beloved children of God.



"I know that there is nothing better for people than to be happy and to do good while they live. That each of them may eat and drink, and find satisfaction in all their toil—this is the gift of God." (Ecclesiastes 3:12-13)



Holy Communion, the Meal, is another major component in Christian worship service. We celebrate Holy Communion as a reminder of Christ's sacrifice. As we gather around the table we are nourished by the bread and wine, the body and blood of Christ and linked together as a community with the whole church on earth and in heaven.



Meals are powerful times to come together as a community and one of the purposes of gathering for communion isn't just to celebrate this sacred meal, but to be reminded that all meals are sacred, that any time we gather at the table whether it be at church, or with our families at home, this is sacred space.



Each year we proudly welcome newcomers to the table as they receive the sacrament of Holy Communion. On the eve of their First Communion, our 5th grade students make the communion bread that will be blessed and shared the next day.



Throughout this year we shared fellowship at the table in a variety of ways, gathering for many nourishing meals as a community.



The Lenten season this year saw the return of our dinner church gatherings, the first time such gatherings had happened since before COVID. These gatherings provided us an opportunity to experience first hand the power of gathering around the table together in a unique and relaxed worship experience.

On Easter Sunday morning joined as a community for an Easter breakfast which not only nourished our bodies, but fed our Spirits as well as we enjoyed one another's company and enhanced our Easter celebration.



Our Pub Theology group regularly gathered around the table, this time at a local restaurant to enjoy food and drink, as well as engaging in a thought-provoking conversation about that month's topic. Some of the topics that were discussed included: wisdom, creativity, freedom, prayer, fun, waiting, hope, and are we alone in the universe. These gatherings allowed all of the participants to be reminded of the tangible grace

and love of God that we experience when we share a meal together, experiencing joy, laughter, and connection with one another.

During the summer, we gathered together as a congregation and joined by members of the surrounding community for our second annual summer BBQ which not only supplied us with delicious food, but also served as a fundraiser which helps ministries at St. James continue to do the work that God has called us to do.



Even our preschool kids learn the value of a shared community meal. The week leading up to Thanksgiving, His Kids students worked together to make a Thanksgiving "feast" for each other, their parents and teachers.

Finally, and most frequently, we gathered as a congregation each Sunday for our Hospitality hour after worship. This time of food and fellowship is an extension of the sacred meal that we experience in worship as we gather together as a community, share what is going on in our lives, offer encouraging words, and experience life together. The time that is shared, often with the sound of children playing in the background, serves to bond us together more strongly as a community and reminds us that God's grace is present with us no matter where we might be going next.





Gathering for meals is a sacred experience and thankfully God has blessed us with many opportunities to do just that.

Sending

"In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven." (Matthew 5:16)



As each worship service comes to a close we enter a time of sending. This portion of the service involves turning our attention to the world around us as we leave the worship space, filled with the grace of God. We are called to go and be Christ's hands and feet to the world, bearing witness to God's transformative love through our words and our actions. We do this in so many ways. God has placed each of us in unique settings in which we can authentically share the good news with the people that we encounter. Sometimes this takes place in our workplaces and our neighborhoods, other times it takes place in the places we feel called to go to in order to be of service to those in need.



Each and every one of us are invited to share the love of God in our community, even the youngest among us. This past year Arcadia at Limerick Pointe invited the students of His Kids to an intergenerational Birthday Party for Dr. Seuss in March 2023. The children listened to Dr. Seuss books and sang silly songs along with our new Arcadia friends. These outings to Arcadia are meaningful to both the kids and the residents.



During the summer, God called us to serve our brothers and sisters in eastern Kentucky through the Appalachia Service Project. Through this ministry, 15 people from our congregation and a partner congregation, Grace Lutheran in Royersford, traveled down to Breathitt County, Kentucky to help serve families that were devastated by flooding the prior year.

Projects included replacing flood damaged interiors with new insulation and walls, flooring and kitchens. Those who served found that though the work was exhausting, their hearts were full from the love, kindness, and gratitude shared by those they were blessed to serve.









God also moved us to serve our local community through the continuation of ministries such as Operation Smart Start and Shining Star. This past year Operation Smart Start provided 218 backpacks filled with school supplies to local area schools. Likewise Operation Shining Star continued to be a blessing by providing 157 \$50 gift cards to families in our area. We are grateful to God for the abundant blessings that we have received, and honored that we get to participate in God's blessings being poured out on our surrounding neighbors.

"When I gave a single mom with four children a Giant gift card, she began to cry." She told me, "I didn't know where I would get the money to make my children a special Christmas dinner. I am overwhelmed that people who don't even know me care about me and my children.""

Finally in addition to Shining Star this past Christmas we were able to join with one of our ministry partners, Spring-Ford Project Outreach, in "adopting" 5 families to bless with gifts for Christmas. The program focuses on gifts for children age 0-14, so while we may not know who else is in the households, we know that over 100 gifts were graciously given to those families. We pray helped them to have an even more joyous and Merry Christmas.





# Amen

In his book "When Church Stops Working" author Andrew Root writes:

"Too often we believe there is something else we should be doing than being together, eating, storytelling, praying, and remembering, rehearsing again and again the story of Jesus Christ's life and its meaning. Yet, it's only out of this being together, this waiting, that we encounter the living God. In encountering this living God we are called out into the world to follow this God who loves the world."

This is who we are, a people who are called to gather together in community, share the story of God's grace in the world, encounter God's grace in meals shared at the altar and at the table, and go out to serve our wider community and the world.

This predictable yet comforting pattern is a part of the fabric of all that we do as people of God, and it is all made possible by the love and grace of our God who journeys with us every step of the way.

As we look to the coming year ahead, may God continue to speak to us and guide us forward, may we seek and find God in the midst of everything that we do, and may we trust that at the center of it all is our God who has claimed us as God's own, and will never let us go. May the Grace and Peace of Christ be with you all. Amen.
